Kroombit Tops Trip Report 7-8 Oct 2006



With the early sunrise at this time of year, our trip participants were all assembled for the 7.30am departure time. At our meeting point, Peter ran through some of the basic convoy procedures for the benefit of our visitors, Phil & Brandon.

With his previous experience, Graeme was appointed to lead the way as we headed south to Calliope to meet up with Biloela Bill. Here we discovered

the first problem – Brandon's radio didn't have Ch 30 available! Consequently he missed the views along the old Bruce H'way 'Woolwash' section. Since this was completely dry, he didn't miss much but he did wonder where everyone had gone!

Brandon and family (Jenny & Felicity) beat us all to Calliope and introduced themselves to Bill who had an early start. After we had all stretched legs, it was decided to head to Boynedale for morning tea. This camp area on the upper reaches of the Awoonga dam is a great camp spot and popular in school holidays, but the turn off is easily missed!

From here we followed the Cedarvale road to enter Kroombit Tops from the south. This old track links up with the Monto access road leading directly to the main Kroombit lookout and provides a good alternative to the northern Tableland access. Some patches are a bit rocky, but all vehicles and drivers had no problems with the conditions.

There was a lot of smoke over the hills, so the photos all show smoke haze.

We spent the afternoon driving around the crashed bomber circuit, taking plenty of time to inspect the remains of the plane. Then it was off to find a camp site. Because we had activities planned for early on Sunday, we camped close to the Forestry barracks. The area directly opposite the barracks had been recently burned out and some logs were still smouldering. (As I write this report some 10 days later, the newspaper reports that Kroombit is now closed because the fires are still burning and causing problems with falling trees and branches.)

First thing on Sunday was to check out some of the Bicentennial horse trail. We were watching the time here so made a U turn without reaching any defined end to the 4WD access.


Back at camp we packed the tents that had dried in the morning sun, had smoko and said farewell to Brandon, Jenny & Felicity who were returning via the Tableland road.



The rest of us did some more exploration and found another interesting route back home. There was one steep climb involved, so ask Graeme why 5½ is significant.


This was an enjoyable trip for all and a great introduction to 4WD touring for our visitors. We hope to see them on future trips.

The Winter Tour of Kroombit Tops - 2005



First, a quick overview of Kroombit Tops.

Kroombit Tops is 85kms south west of Gladstone. Kroombit Tops is 41,900ha in size and the plateau is 800 meters above sea level. It rises to about 930 meters at Amy's Peak and about 940 meters on the ridge between Kroombit and dry creek valleys.

Kroombit Tops, was traditionally a state forest under sheep grazing leases first established around 1854 and it was not until the late 1990's that this area was reassessed and gazetted a national park. The first roads into Kroombit Tops where pushed through in the late 1960's for forestry workers. The major access road was completed in 1967, logging of hardwood trees commenced in 1969, and from 1981 hoop pine was harvested. In the 1970's forestry workers built the wooden barracks you see today. In the 1860's a fellow by the name of James Griffiths came to the tablelands for the gold rush, a creek was named after him called the "Griffiths Creek". Kroombit Tops is the only place in the world that the "Kroombit Tinkerfrog" is found. The area that this frog resides in is called the Scientific area and is of limits to the public because of the risk of spreading the Chytrid Fungus. This fungus has been attributed to the decline of not only the Kroombit Tinkerfrog but also two other threatened frogs – the cascade treefrog and the tusked frog.



Now, here's what happened.....

Well what a fantastic trip!! The climate for the trip was set early as a relaxing weekend with plenty of time allocated to just sitting back and enjoying the mountain air. Coming along to enjoy the trip was Mardi and Jerrod and the kids in the only "Toyota" Prado. Then came the rest of the "MIGHTY PATROLS"...Anthony in the big 3L Patrol with his side kick XXXX, Russell and Katrina and their kids in their GQ Patrol, Vince (AKA SLICK) and Jake in their GQ Patrol and Bryce and myself in the Big Red GU Patrol. Obviously, we tried to make Jerrod and Mardi feel right at home up front with some witty UHF talk. Ha Ha Ha!!

We departed O'Shanesy Park at approx 7:30am and headed off to the Gracemere turnoff to pick up Ben and Shayleen in yet another GQ Patrol. Once Ben joined the convoy it was off to the Calliope cross roads to meet Darren from Gladstone who has been a member of our club for the last 12 months and yes, you guessed it, another GU Patrol. Jerrod was feeling right at home now with 6 Patrols and only one Toyota.

We then set of to Kroombit Tops and arrived at the Ranger station at approx 10:30am. Once we finished our morning tea we headed off to the Lookout. Jerrod informed us that the temp outside the vehicles was just 14 degrees. Ouch. How? Well, it's a Prado Grande thing you wouldn't understand! We arrived at the lookout to Jerrod's predicted very cold breeze and a view back across the Boyne Valley, starting from the left you can see the ocean at Gladstone, past the Awoonga Dam and Castle

Tower National Park. To the right of this you can see Mt Stanley and the Many Peaks Ranges. On the far right of the Boyne Valley you can see Mt Robert.

After enjoying the view we then made our way to "Beautiful Betsy" the WW2 Bomber that crashed in the 1940's and was not found until the late 1990's in the ranges behind us. We arrived at the Plane wreck at 12:30 and spent the next hour and a half looking at the wreckage and taking the whole scene in. It really is a sight to be seen guys! You should put it at the top of your 'to do' lists if you have not been for a look as it is truly amazing.

The kids had a ball looking at and identifying all the different parts of the wreck and the information boards where packed with information for the big kids to ponder over. The National Parks have really done a fantastic job in opening this historic site for all of us to visit.

Once we made our way back to the cars we then headed to "The Wall" which is only 500m down the track to set up our camp. The Wall is a vertical rock face approx 100 feet high with a small creek at the base of it. The creek had no water and the kids soon had it sussed out to play in.

We set up camp and got to work on setting up the camp fire for the night. Once we unloaded all the firewood that we had brought in for the occasion (if every body brings a bit you end up with a lot) we headed out to find some new tracks to explore. We found a track heading to a look out with a "nice" log half across it and put up the challenge. Every body made it across the log with out any damage and made their way to the look out.

We headed back to the camp at approx 4:45 to get some tucker ready and sit back and enjoy the night. Well, what a great fire the wind was nowhere to be seen and the temp was no so bad ... was it guys. We enjoyed each others company and told lots of camp fire stories with maybe a little bit of help from the bottle fairies and settled into bed at midnight. Most of us slept in to around 8am and slowly started to have some brekkie and get the camps packed back up and storied away for another's day 4WDing.

We made our way back to the look out where we met up with Steve & Diane from Biloela in yes, another GU Patrol. Much to Jerrod's relief Steve brought along Adam & Melinda in their brand new Prado. The count was now Patrol 7; Toyota 2.

Steve showed us some tracks on some very detailed maps that he had brought along and we made the decision to head off and try and tackle one. Getting towards the end of the one-way track we passed a very steep disused track to the right and put the word out for those keen to have a go to try it on the way back. On the return, I had a go first and was surprised at how soft and slippery the ground was on this track. I had to engage the front locker to final make my way to the top and put out the invite to the rest of the crew to have a go. Jerrod was next in the mighty Prado Grande and I've got to tell you this guy has balls the size of coconuts!! The expression on Mardie's face was worth a million dollars as Jerrod tried and tried again to get up this hill but even with the aid of a rear locker and dropping his tyre pressure he was unable to get to the top. Adam from Biloela was next in his Brand new Prado, 6 weeks old and try as he may he could not get up this hill either. Vince in the might double locked GQ gave it a go and after a couple of attempts drove it easy. **GO THE MIGHTY PATROLS!!**

We then headed back to the Ranger station for lunch. After lunch, Ben and Russell headed back to Rock Vegas and Anthony and Darren headed back to Gladstone. This left Vince and Steve and I in the Patrols and Jerrod and Adam in the Prados. We headed to a track that took us along a Razer Back track to the back of Biloela. Early on this track the GPS was telling us that we where 420 meters high. The view was amazing as there were vertical drops on both sides of us and views that I would suggest that very few people have had the privilege of enjoying. Jerrod found the going a bit tough on one of the hills towing his camper trailer so the Big Red GU had to snatch him up the hill to a suitable spot to unhook him and continue with the track. No, we hardly took the piss out of him at all. I know that's what you where thinking? We eventually made our way to Kroombit Park - Lochenbar Station. See link. Then on to Kroombit Dam, which is basically a feeder dam to the Callide Valley underground springs. We then headed back to Biloela to fuel up and say goodbye to our brand new club members from Biloela.

ROCKY SWAP - AUGUST 6TH 2005

Rocky Swap preparations started a few months before the event and as with any event this size, a lot of planning goes into it to make it all appear to run smooth.

The steel for the travel ramp was donated by Graeme Filer of the 4wd Repair Shop. The design was courtesy of Darrel Wright and welded together by Jason St John and Lachlan Nelson. After a few last minute additions it was off to the powder coaters for nice finish of safety yellow, just to make sure it stood out as well as being the new club colours. New signage, explaining how the travel ramp worked, and a brand new club banner was donated by Brad and Roxanne Dukes from Tint-a-Car.

Then came the test track with a Russell Mason inspired design. Construction of this began the weekend before the swap by an enthusiastic construction crew of 10-15 people. (amazing what the lure of a few beers will achieve!!)

We were lucky enough to have the monster trucks in town a few weeks before and they had kindly left behind a heap of dirt from their display, so we grabbed the opportunity and utilised this for our show. With machinery and operators donated to us from Hopkins Brothers and Beaver the bobcat operator performing his wheelies and balancing acts, the track was soon taking shape. With some spectacular shovel work from Jason St John (who wasn't even able to make it for the day of the swap) and some gentle persuasion from the rest of the workers to stop Jason digging to China, the wombat holes were soon deep enough to satisfy all of the 'supervisors'.

With some old timber garden edging the vehicle drop off was constructed and test driven by a few itchy foots, and with a few modifications it stood up well to the following weekends driving.

An off camber turn followed by a 2m hill, down into some well placed logs and rocks and drivers were looking at the face of a 4m high hill with no run up. Fortunately after watering down the track on the day of construction, during the week and on the night before hand, the track and hill held together well, with drivers being able to idle around if they had the little buttons in their cars from ARB called diff locks.

Not wanting to be outdone by the diff locked cars Dan Curran decided to show us how to do it in a Jeep **without** lockers! This bought out lots of smiles and cheers from the construction crew with remarks like "Bloody Jeeps" being heard frequently.

Finally the track was finished, all the steel fencing was put in place and grandstands for the expected crowd wheeled into position.

The Friday night before the Swap arrived almost too early with vehicles being set up for the static display on car ramps, hay bails etc. The club marquee arrived and was soon erected by eager members helping for the night. Photos of our escapades adorned the inside of the marquee with our banners lining the fencing for people to see. TJM [thanks to Ben] was there with a few of their awesome vehicles in the static display, along with an assortment of club members' cars.

The travel ramp arrived and was set up and was eagerly tested, just to see if it worked. Signage donated by Brad and Roxanne was erected in front of the ramp explaining RTI and how it was derived, and with last minute car arrivals for the static display and the obligatory drive around the test track again for the helpers, (something about wanting to make sure they didn't get stuck in front of the crowd...had to come from the jeep drivers that comment) and all was set for the 6am start on Saturday.

But one car was still missing, that of track designer Russell Mason who was known to be installing his auto gearbox on that very night.

Midnight came and the crowd departed home with big smiles and looking forward to the morning. Shae, Paul, Andrea and myself camped the night to look after the display.

5am Saturday morning was still pitch dark and after breathing on the zipper of the tent to defrost it for a couple of minutes before I could open it, (seriously, I'm not joking. Well felt like it anyway). I peeked out of my sleeping bag. There was already a line up of cars coming in to the swap with still no Russell. At that stage I saw the Old Man Emu ute come through the gate and knew Russell would be looking for someone very soon. Should I pretend to be asleep and let him wander around a bit looking for someone or should I get up? I thought. Hmmm is bloody cold out there! I thought, but I really should get up. Oh well.

On went the beanie and the jacket and trying to hide my shivering I greeted the bleary eyed Russell who had just finished working all night to get his auto back in just so he could drive around the test track. You could never say this man isn't committed to the club. After a quick hello and where is your car, I was in the passenger door on the way back to get Russell's car. A quick change of drivers and we were back to the swap to put the mighty GQ in the track display.

Jeff Winter, another man committed to having a good time was still manning the gate after doing an all nighter performing his duties for the Rotary club. After a quick wave to Jeff I was on my out to Gracemere to deposit a very tired Mr Mason to a welcoming bed for a few brief hours rest before he came back in.

With minutes to spare before the 6am shutdown I was once again waved in by Jeff through the gate and after parking the ute on the track, the sleep over team which had thawed themselves out, made last minute preparations to make sure everything was ready.

8am was the time for our first show and with most of the drivers turning up before the start, all was set for a great day. We began driving around the track and quickly a crowd gathered around the fence line of the display. With cars driving the travel ramp and RTI scores recorded for the crowd to see there was plenty of action but something was missing.

We had obtained a PA system for the show but had not yet set it up. So set up it was but we still needed someone to speak. Up stepped MC Curran with a running commentary on all the vehicles driving around, providing the ensuing crowd with details about car modifications, drivers and competitions entered. The static display as well as the marquee was not forgotten with details about the club, it's members and when and where we meet being broadcast many times during the day. I think Dan really found his calling doing this he and the crowd really enjoyed themselves.

With shows scheduled for every hour between 8am and 3pm the day quickly went by. A BBQ lunch cooked by our cruising president Mr Kenny Hodge, foundation member Sue Filer and Darren Standfast saw everyone manning the display both static and moving with full stomachs ready to continue the afternoon.

The crowd watching the display which never dropped below 50 people and often swelled to over 300 were treated to different driving techniques as MC Dan Curran pointed, out telling and showing everyone the difference between locked and unlocked vehicles, front and rear departure angles, suspension modifications and so on.

Then the boys in the centre had a quick chat and decided to do a bit of training for the Logan Challenge by towing a "dead car" (Andrea's GQ shorty was nominated) around the track and to show it could be done. My car "the tractor" as it is commonly called these days was hooked to the front with a tree trunk protector and Russell's GQ was hooked to the rear in the same fashion. Off we went around the track banging and clunking until the first hill where some serious manoeuvring was done to get all 3 cars around the tight turn and lined up for the rock and log obstacle. Once this was done it was across the rocks and to the bottom of the big hill. A few goes with the tractor to climb the obstacle while Russell merrily bounced his way through the logs and we were at the end. A round of applause from the crowd and we disconnected all the cars and set up for the hand and electric winch demo's. With big Phil Benson assisted by Brad Wiess (B1), Brad Dukes (B2) and Greg Ward (Wardy) manning the hand winch, the car was soon hoisted over the big hill in record time. Well done guys!

Amazing how the time flies when your having fun with 3pm coming quite rapidly. With the crowd reduced now to a trickle the decision was made to start pulling everything down. Everyone there for the day put in one last big effort and got into dismantling the display. With the space of 2 hours all was gone and after a lot of grins and congratulations from everyone who had manned our display the Rocky Swap was over for another year.



Boiling time on stove: 5minutes

Cooking time in the Dream-Pot®: 30 minutes minimum

Ingredients

1 tblsp flour 1 tsp garlic powder

1 sml oven bag ½ red onion, thinly sliced

2 large chicken breast fillets, ½ cup Palms™ Sweet Mango

approx 250g each (cut in halves Chutney

to make 4 fillets)

1 ripe mango, sliced thickly

Method:

1. Place the flour in the oven bag and shake to coat the bag. The excess flour will naturally thicken the juices as a sauce.

- 2. Place the chicken breasts into the bag, then add the remaining ingredients.
- 3. Tie the bag closed securely in a knot, close to the chicken but be sure to expel as much air as possible to prevent the bag from floating. Also tie the top strip around the knot.
- 4. Place the oven bag into the large inner pot.
- 5. Carefully pour hot water into the inner pot (not directly over the bag) until the water covers the bag, to come approximately 3-4 cm from the top of the pot.
- 6. Bring to the boil, covered with the lid, lower the heat and adjust to maintain a gentle boil is maintained. It is also important not to boil longer than 5 minutes when using chicken fillets.
- 7. Transfer to the Dream-Pot® for the required minimum cooking time.
- 8. Prior to serving, <u>carefully</u> remove the bag and place onto a suitable dish. Snip one corner of the bottom of the bag to allow the sauce to flow out into the dish.
- 9. Thinly slice the fillets to serve, accompanied by the mango sauce.

Note: If using 1kg chicken lovely legs (skinless drumsticks), adjust the boiling time to 10 minutes and minimum cooking time to 1hour. Thigh fillets trimmed of fat, could also be used.
